<ul> <li>Clear problem outline and embedding of the master's thesis in a public policy and/or public organisational context;</li> </ul>
The thesis question clearly falls within the subject domain of the master's specialisation;
Clear academic and social relevance for carrying out the research;
• Structure of the research question: clear definition of the phenomenon to be
analysed and coherence of sub-questions.
Development of a consistent theoretical framework to answer the research question – proper (deductive or inductive) development of hypotheses
<ul> <li>Clear conceptualisation of the terms used and the (causal) relations between concepts;</li> </ul>
Proper embedding in, and critical evaluation of, the academic literature in the field.
<ul> <li>Appropriate research design and data collection strategy, in line with the research question and available sources of data (also applies to the construction of a policy plan or the analysis of a process within an organisation if applicable);</li> </ul>
The research design and data collection process is replicable;
<ul> <li>Clear justification of choices made with respect to the operationalization of dependent and independent variables as required by the research design (reliability and validity).</li> </ul>
The methods chosen are appropriate and sufficient given the research design and time span of the thesis;
Systematic analysis of (quantitative/qualitative) data;
• Correct interpretation of data; distinguishing between empirical statements and opinions or allegations;
Accurate reporting and critical discussion of results.
Accurate and succinct summary of the results.
A clear and well substantiated answer to the research question with regard to the theory used
Linking research results back to theoretical chapter
A convincing discussion of the limitations of the research
A convincing discussion of possible avenues for future research
Convincing policy recommendations / practical implications of the research.
